2. Description of discipline:

The purpose of the academic discipline Latin is to equip the student with practical skills that allow him to successfully overcome the terminological difficulties of international Greek-Latin terminology in the development of general cultural (IC) and professional (SPC) competencies in the shell, both Russian and English. To lay the foundations for the terminological training of future specialists, to teach students consciously and competently use medical terms in Latin, as well as terms of Greek-Latin origin in English.

At the same time, the tasks of the discipline are:

- professional orientation and concentration of methodological efforts on those sections of the grammar of the Latin language that are of practical importance for obtaining general cultural (IC) and professional (SPC) competencies in the direction of preparing the specialty "Medicine";
- the use as educational material mainly of vocabulary, which consists of nomenclature names of national and international Latin scientific nomenclature, especially used in prescription documentation;
- the formation of practical skills of correct gender and multicultural verbal and non-verbal communication in the process of interactive teaching methods in the classroom;
- the formation of a student's active vocabulary from the golden fund of Latin ethical and deontological winged expressions and aphorisms that help to increase and strengthen the authority of both professional and general cultural competencies.

The place of discipline in the structure of the basic educational program BEP (prerequisites, postrequisites) –

The discipline "Latin language" refers to the basic part of the disciplines of the humanitarian, social and economic cycle of the PEP training specialists in the direction of "Medicine". It is an ideological and scientific-methodological basis for the study of humanitarian and socio-economic disciplines.

Prerequisites: Students are trained on the basis of the continuity of knowledge and skills obtained in the course of English grammar, the basics of general biology, general chemistry of general educational institutions.

Post requisites: Pharmacology, human anatomy, normal physiology and subsequent study of most professional disciplines.

Competencies of students, formed as a result of mastering the discipline, planned results of mastering the academic discipline.

As a result of mastering the discipline, the student must:

Know:

- Latin alphabet, pronunciation and stress rules;
- elements of Latin grammar necessary for understanding and education medical terms, as well as for writing and translating prescriptions;
- on the principles of creating international nomenclatures in Latin;
- typological features of terms in different sections of the medical terminology;
- basic medical and pharmaceutical terminology in Latin;
- official requirements for issuing a prescription in Latin language ways and means of terms formation in anatomical, clinical and pharmaceutical terminology;
- 400 terminological units and terminological elements at the level of long-term memory as an active vocabulary and 10 Latin proverbs and aphorisms, student anthem "Gaudeamus".

Be able to:

- read and write in Latin;
- translate without a dictionary from Latin into English, as well as from English into Latin anatomical, clinical and pharmaceutical terms and recipes, as well as professional

expressions and stable combinations used in anatomical-histological, clinical and pharmaceutical nomenclatures;

- determine the general meaning of clinical terms in accordance with productive models based on the learned minimum of Greek the origin of term elements to form clinical terms;
- competently draw up the Latin part of the recipe;
- form the names in Latin of chemical compounds (acids, oxides, salts) and translate them from Latin into English and from English to Latin;
- isolate frequency segments in the composition of drug names,
- carrying certain information about the drug;
- use at least 400 terminological units and term elements.

Own:

- reading and writing skills in Latin for clinical and pharmaceutical terms and recipes;
- basic information conversion technologies, networking techniques Internet for professional activities.
